# Important Reminders from PMCPOA Regarding Animals

Per Article 7, Rules Regarding Wildlife

The feeding of bears, mountain lions, bobcats, raccoons, foxes and/or coyotes is strictly prohibited on any lot or other portion of the Pine Mountain Club Development. This prohibition will be strictly enforced. The association shall investigate all reports of feeding wildlife and, if deemed a violation, a citation shall be issued and the Department of Fish and Wildlife shall be notified.

#### Association Rule 4.07

PMC Patrol would like to remind all members and guests of Association Rule 4.07: Pets shall not be left outside unattended between dusk and dawn. This rule was designed for the safety of everyone's pets, and for the residents who are kept awake at night because someone's dog is barking constantly.

# Lynn Stafford Offers Helpful Information About Yellowjacket Safety

A PMC resident reported that he and his dogs were attacked and stung by very aggressive yellowjackets or some kind of wasps on the trail at the end of Ironwood Drive in late August. He said that the insects came from a nest in the ground, and the swarm was very sudden. We want to make the following helpful information known, and remember, if you hike or walk your dog in that area, be aware!

Lynn Stafford, a PMCPOA member and resident, is a retired biologist who has had lots of experience with yellowjackets in the field. He has offered the following information to help us be aware of the potential danger of yellowjackets. Here is what he has to say:

I think that I am more concerned about being hurt by yellowjackets than any other North American animal, except grizzly and polar bears and certain humans.

Yellowjackets are one species of wasp. Most wasps and bees 'YELLOW' Continued on page 12

# Not Every Hero Wears a Cape Plan and Practice Your Escape

#### PMCPOA Emergency Preparedness Committee

Fire Prevention Week is Oct. 6-12. Everyday steps can create heroic results. In a home fire, you may have as little as two minutes to escape from the time the smoke alarm initially sounds. It is important that people take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

#### Make a Home Fire Escape Plan

• Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your household.

• Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.

• Have an outside meeting place.

• Practice your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home twice a year.

• Practice using different ways out.

• Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.

• Close doors behind you as you leave.

#### If the Alarm Sounds

• If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.

• If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.

• CALL the fire department from outside your home.

#### Make Sure Your Home Has Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarms

• Install smoke alarms in every bedroom and outside each sleeping area on each level of the home. Install alarms in the basement and garage.

• It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one alarm sounds they all sound.

• Test smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarms are working.

• Replace batteries twice a year, when you change your clocks to and from daylight saving time.

• Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

#### Great California Shakout

The Great California Shakeout is Oct. 17 at 10:17 a.m. Time to practice your "Drop, Cover and Hold." It is also a good time to review your Emergency Plans and what you would do in the event of an earthquake.


# Family Resource Center Fundraiser 'Begins with You'

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

<u>**Response:**</u> Our apologies. This should not have happened. It has been addressed with staff.

#### SUGGESTION

• Talking to several RAs at the pool, I have observed their increased job stress

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and frustration over the increase in Airbnb guests. Their stress could be mitigated by requiring homeowners to have a letter of agreement with the club that renters will be notified of and required to observe the CCCs. Homeowners should then have a letter of agreement with the renters that they will observe the CCCs. A few simple rules could be highlighted: No minors in the bar after 9 p.m.; each guest must have a guest card; no barbecuing at the pool. Several times, groups of 15 renters have appeared at the pool with one guest card. They are then sent to the pro shop to purchase additional cards.

**Response:** Most of your suggestions

are already in place. We were stricter this year. Every guest who entered the pool had to have their own guest card. We did not turn anyone away from the pool this year because only six guests from one property were allowed. The barbecue incident happened last year by a member and they graciously removed the barbecue.

The same holds true with the archery range. Please remember that this is not a play area. If you are shooting with a bow and arrow, please do not let your children play anywhere near the targets.

We have walking trails that are gorgeous, and a lovely park. Please use them. We would hate to see anyone get injured or worse.

are very territorial around their nest, but not around their food. That is very true with yellowjackets. They will share your hamburger with you as you are eating it, and leave peacefully when you shoo them away.

What makes them so dangerous is they don't nest in an obvious hornet's nest, paper wasp nest or mud dauber nest. They just nest in an insignificant hole in the ground the size of a pencil. All one has to do is stand in the wrong spot too long to get stung many times.

A yellowjacket nest could be along any trail within or adjacent to PMC. Here are some precautions to take: Never walk anywhere in a field without knowing where your next step will be before committing to it. This will not only help protect against stepping on a rattlesnake, but it will also help prevent stopping on or immediately next to a yellowjacket nest hole. Vigilance is important.

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The only times I have had problems (and I have spent thousands of hours in the field) are when I was surveying birds in a carefully designed study. I would stop at one spot for 10 minutes and listen to a birdsong carefully. The fact that I happened onto a nest, and then lingered, is what got me into trouble. I can identify yellowjackets pretty easily; I just make sure they are foraging for food, not at a

Two days ago, our cat left a dead bat at the foot of the steps. At least six to eight yellowjackets were feasting as I attempted to identify the bat. We did not bother each other.
