It will be due and payable on July 1, 2018 and will become delinquent on Saturday, Sept. 15, 2018 at the close of business at 2:00 p.m. pursuant to Bylaws Section 10.02. PMCPOA is accepting prepayments for the 2018/19 assessment if you would like to get a head start on it. You can mail a check, or come by the office or call us with a credit card. Some members find this a little easier than coming up with the total amount all at once in July.

When making a payment, please include your tract and lot numbers, which are found on your member/guest card right under your name. We want to make sure the payment gets applied to the right account.

Remember: the Deadline for PMC Lot Clearance is June 1

June 1st is the deadline for brush and dead tree clearance for each lot. You don't want to get a hefty fine from the Fire Department, so get those dead trees, weeds, pine needles and pine cones picked up and taken to the green waste site.

It's PMC Election Time Again

The PMCPOA election takes place at the Members' Annual Meeting on Saturday, June 16, 2018 when three new members will be elected to the Board of Directors for three-year terms, and one new member will be elected for a two-year term. There are also 10 proposed bylaw revisions on the ballot. Voting will take place up until the closing of the ballot box on election day (usually around 1 p.m.). An Inspector of Elections tallies the votes, with the winners announced immediately thereafter. Election packets will be mailed to the membership this month.

DEFENSIBLE SPACE WORKS! MAKE YOUR HOME FIRE SAFE

Emergency Preparedness Committee

A DEFENSIBLE SPACE OF 100 feet around your home is required by law. The goal is to protect your home while providing a safe area for firefighters.

ZONE ONE: Zone One extends 30 feet from buildings, structures, decks, etc.

• Remove ALL combustible fuels in this area.

• Remove leaf litter (dry leaves, pine needles, etc. from yard, roof and rain gutters).

• Relocate woodpiles or other combustible materials into Zone Two.

ZONE TWO: 30 feet to 100 feet from the structure. Reduce ALL combustible fuels in this area.

- 10-foot clearance around stovepipe/chimney outlets.
- 10-foot clearance around propane tanks.
- Remove all dead limbs that are overhanging any structures.

• Remove "ladder fuels" (low-level vegetation that allows the fire to spread from the ground to the tree canopy). Remove lower limbs of non-ornamentals to a height of at least 6 feet.

KERN COUNTY FIRE HAZARD REDUCTION PROGRAM MUST BE COMPLETED BY JUNE 1st.

Note that this is earlier than previous years. Beginning June 2nd, Fire Department personnel will begin inspecting properties. Properties found to be in violation will be issued a \$500 citation. The owner of the property will be given 15 days from the mailing date of the citation to either dispute the citation or show proof the violation was corrected.

A Message from the Board Chair

The April Board meeting covered many topics. The assessment for the upcoming fiscal year was approved and will be \$1,464 per lot. It represents a \$12 increase over the current year to reflect the cost of the state's actions increasing the minimum wage. We will see continuing increases in the minimum wage for the next two years and will need to account for the state-mandated increases in future budgets.

In a sad commentary on the world in which we find ourselves in 2018, I reported on the first "Active Shooter" training course conducted for the senior staff of the PMCPOA. It was a sobering experience, and we will conduct the course for our staff on a regular basis going forward. Many thanks to Greg Jehle, an investigator for the Kern County Office of the District Attorney who is a member of PMCPOA, for providing the course. He has also offered several suggestions for management to consider in the future for the safety of our employees and members. You will see some changes in the lobby and elsewhere as a result. The safety of our staff is a primary concern of the Board and we will continue to review our policies and procedures with an eye to improving all safety measures.

The Board also took action to increase the reward for the capture and prosecution of the person or persons responsible for spreading nails on the road at several locations in PMC. This is a serious problem that has continued for far too long. If anyone wishes to contribute to the reward, which now stands a \$1,000, please contact the office. Any help would be appreciated. Please be alert; this needs to stop.

We also approved the slate of members running for the Board and the election package for the June ballot. There are nine people running. Please try to attend one of the "Meet the Candidates" events so that you can meet and evaluate them. As some of you know, due to the process of re districting, the mountain communities -- including PMC -- will lose David Couch as our Supervisor in November of this year. We will become part of the district represented by Zak Scribner. This summer, we will, as we have in the past, hold a Round Table for Supervisor Couch. I hope all of you turn out for it. Supervisor Couch has been a good friend to PMC and he will be missed. We will also invite Mr. Scribner to hold a Round Table here at PMC this summer on a date of his choosing. We look forward to working with him in any way we can.

If you have not been to the mountains lately, you will be pleased to know that spring is arriving quickly. We have a very busy summer ahead with many events and activities scheduled. As always, PMC is a beautiful place to live or visit. May we all enjoy the summer! Winter will be here soon enough!

SUGGESTION

CONCERNS

• I was somewhat concerned over the recent suggestion of allowing mountain bikes on the horse/hiking trails surrounding PMC. Having a home here for nearly 30 years, my husband and I have enjoyed walking the trails for hours in peace and calm. Having a home on the Palos Verdes peninsula also, we are well aware of the dangers and conflicts of horses, hikers and bikes using the same trails. Usually, hikers and horses move more slowly and can make room for each other. This is not the case with mountain bikes. We have found that there needs to be trails that are designated for all, and other trails that are clearly marked prohibiting the use of bikes. This is for the safety of everyone concerned.

<u>Response</u>: We have heard from several horse owners, and their response is the same as yours. This could be very dangerous for all if a horse should get spooked and rear up. Thank you for your input.

• Our first experience coming for the buffet dinner was on St. Patrick's Day night on March 17. I'm sorry to say that my friend found a long 2" x ¹/₂" wide piece of plastic in the corned beef & cabbage with mashed potatoes. Later, he took his plate to the kitchen and showed it to Jean. I had Shepherd's Pie, a spoonful of potatoes and salad on my plate. I felt something was wrong when I couldn't finish it. The carrot cake was very good, but after one bite I couldn't tolerate it. (I love dessert.) When I got home, the pain really kicked in that night, all day Sunday and Sunday night. I experienced awful pain in my gut. Monday I recovered, weak as a cat. We used to be regulars at the former Bistro and Lounge. We realize that the clubhouse has been going through changes that challenge the best of you. But, until we feel comfortable with those changes, we will abstain from participating.

Response: We are very sorry you did not enjoy your first buffet experience with us. This was on St. Patrick's Day, and everyone we spoke to had a great time and said they enjoyed the food. We hope you will accept our sincerest apologies and we will continue to work hard to make all other buffets a great experience. We hope you will come back soon and try us again.

• We were recently the victims of wireless theft totaling more than \$350, and I hate to say that the perpetrator most likely lives within our community. This is something everyone should be aware of, because working as a community, we can stop our local cyber criminals.

Because our internet service is on autopay with Calneva, we did not immediately notice the extraordinary over-usage charges on our bill. This impacted our bills for October through December 2017. When we finally questioned them, they said we were using 10 GB PER DAY. Since we are part-timers, we were not in our home AT ALL during October 2017, so someone hacked our wifi and was downloading at a furious pace, 24 hours a day. We did notice a very dramatic slowing of our internet, which used to be speedy, when we were there in December, but didn't figure out the problem right away. The moment we unplugged our router, the usage returned to zero. My guess is someone was using our data to mine bitcoin or to do a criminal online activity.

Calneva, unfortunately, insisted that the fraudulent charges were entirely our

problem and they have no responsibility to notify us if our usage goes from essentially zero to massive, nor did they care that they billed us for these overages two months after we had already paid for the month in full. They claim inability to track device numbers of logged on machines.

Three lessons we want to share with everyone:

1) Someone in the vicinity of Bernina and Freeman is stealing data from neighbors. If you are in this area, change your wifi password and scrutinize your usage at least once a week. If you notice a sudden slowing of your internet, check your usage and see if it makes sense.

2) Calneva will not protect its customers. It does not operate to the standards of, for example, credit card companies, which take steps to protect customers from fraud. I recommend avoiding Calneva given the choice, or at least monitoring your Calneva usage carefully. If you have a problem, report it to PMCPOA and the Better Business Bureau as I am.

3) If you are a part-time resident, disable your router when you are not in your home.

<u>Response</u>: Thank you for sharing this important message to our members. We all need to be aware that there are those who steal internet out there.

• When will a copy of the current Reserve Study be displayed in the members'only section (of the PMCPOA website) for member review?

<u>**Response:</u>** The Reserve Summary will be mailed to all members in the Assessment Packet before May 10th.</u> Amenities do not have to make a profit. The snow plowing is not profitable...it too is an amenity that we pay for. Please educate our members on what an amenity is.

Response: Thank you for your letter. We agree, and ran a story about just this subject in a recent Condor. Here is part of what we included in that article:

Miriam-Webster offers the following definitions of "amenity": "Something that helps to provide comfort, convenience, or enjoyment," such as "hotels with modern amenities" or "providing residents with the basic amenities." It further defines "amenities" as "The attractiveness and value of real estate or of a residential structure" or "a feature conducive to such attractiveness and value."

Translating this to practical application, amenities in Pine Mountain Club would be those value-added features that make property ownership and living in PMC more pleasant. Examples could include natural amenities such as the views and scenery, forest trails and remote location, or the attractiveness and curb appeal of a particular home. Examples of amenities offered by PMCPOA could include recreational activities, clubs, committees and services such as snow plowing and the duties performed by PMC Patrol and the Business Office.

The word "asset," on the other hand, is defined by Miriam-Webster as follows: "An item of value owned." In practical application for PMC, a member's "assets" would include items such as the home or property he or she owns, the money held in his or her bank account and all of his or her personal belongings, such as vehicles or furniture.
